

Over the next few months, all individuals and interest groups will be given ample opportunity to suggest changes/additions to the new Official Plan."

Beneficial Bugs...Dragonflies and Damselflies and Mayflies

At first glance **dragonflies and damselflies** appear quite similar. Both are long and narrow insects that are beautifully coloured in iridescent greens, blues, yellows and reds. They have small antennae, large eyes that supply them with almost 360° vision, and six legs located near their head that are used more for perching, egg laying and hunting than for walking. Two pairs of wings comprised of small criss-crossing veins add strength and durability.

In general, both **dragonflies and damselflies** prefer well-vegetated lakes, streams and ponds. It is here that they find an abundance of prey including flies, mosquitoes, moths and midges. Emergent and shoreline plants provide areas where they can rest and take cover from predators. Even with their acute vision and agile flight, both **dragonflies and damselflies** fall prey to birds, fish, spiders, frogs, lizards and even other **dragonflies**.

Are they beneficial? Yes! **Dragonflies and damselflies** occupy an important part of the food chain as both predator and prey. While they are harmless to people, they help regulate insect populations, such as mosquitoes and black flies. As nymphs, they provide food for water bugs, beetles and fish, whereas adults are prey for fish, frogs, birds, lizards and spiders. Sensitive to pollution, they are also indicators of healthy ecosystems.



The mayfly (a.k.a. shadfly) belongs to an ancestral division of winged insects which includes dragonflies and damselflies. What we see are clouds of six-legged, clear-winged, multi-tailed bugs swarming around lights or congregating on the sides of buildings.

These adult mayflies, after spending most of their lives (~twelve months) as underwater nymphs will only live for one or two days. They mate (it takes 30 seconds); lay eggs (about an hour later); then promptly die. While small nymphs eat weeds or algae and larger predator nymphs catch smaller insects or aquatic larvae, adult **mayflies** do not feed during their short lives. Contrary to some misconceptions, they also do not sting and do not bite humans!

Are they beneficial? Yes. **Mayflies**, like stoneflies and caddisflies, are a "bioindicator" species used by scientists to measure water quality. **Mayflies** near the lake mean nymphs in the water and lots of nymphs mean a lake or river is clean and healthy. **Mayflies** are also a vital link in the food web of freshwater ecosystems.
